
1.7. Dual Optical Drive Bays

Two 5.25-inch empty bays at the front panel are available for installing two optical drives.



- ① **Dust Cover:** The disk plate of your optical drive will be ejected through this cover plate after pressing the eject button.
- ② **Eject Button:** Press this button to eject the optical drive. (You may have do a little adjusting if the disk plate of your optical drive cannot be ejected by pressing this button: Slide the pointer on the adjusting rod behind this button so as to make it touches the eject button on optical drive.)







2.2. Layout Diagram






2.3. Connectors, Headers and Switches

WARNING: Always power off the computer and unplug the AC power cord before adding or removing any peripheral or component. Failing to so may cause severe damage to your motherboard and/or peripherals. Plug in the AC power cord only after you have carefully checked everything.

2.3.1. ATX Power Input Connectors

This motherboard provides two power connectors to connect to an ATX12V power supply with 300W, 20A +5VDC, and 720mA +5VSB capacity at least.





2.3.2. FAN Connectors

These 3-pin connectors each provide power to the cooling fans installed in your system.


The CPU must be kept cool by using a powerful fan with heatsink. The system is capable of monitoring the speed of the CPU fan.

CPUFAN1: CPU Fan SYSFAN1: System Fan

AUXFAN1: Auxiliary Fan

• NBFAN1: N.B. Chipset Fan

WARNING: These fan connectors are not jumpers. DO NOT place jumper caps on these connectors.



2.3.3. CMOS Memory Clearing Header

This header uses a jumper cap to clear the CMOS memory.

- Pin 1-2 shorted (default): Normal operation.
- **Pin 2-3 shorted:** Clear CMOS memory.




ATTENTION: Turn the system power off first (including the +5V standby power) before clearing the CMOS memory. Failing to do so may cause your system to work abnormally or malfunction.

2.3.4. Accelerated Graphics Port Slot

This slot allows you to connect monitor through an optional AGP card instead of the onboard VGA Out Connector. (Set the "On-Chip VGA" option in the "Advanced Chipset Features" of BIOS menu to [Disabled] accordingly.)


ATTENTION: This motherboard does not support 3.3V AGP cards. Use only 1.5V or 0.8V AGP cards.




The PCI slot allows you to insert PCI card or TV Tuner card.



2.3.6. Front Panel Switches & Indicators Connection Headers

These headers are used for connecting switches and LED indicators on the chassis front panel. The mark "+" align to the pin in the figure below stands for positive polarity for the LED connection.





- HLED (Pin 1, 3):
 Connects to the HDD LED cable of chassis front panel.
- RST (Pin 5, 7):
 Connects to the Reset Switch cable of chassis front panel.
- SPK (Pin 15, 17, 19, 21):
 Connects to the System Speaker cable of chassis.
- SLED (Pin 2, 4):
 Connects to the Suspend LED cable (if there is one) of chassis front panel.

• PWR-ON (Pin 6, 8):


Connects to the Power Switch cable of chassis front panel.

• PLED (Pin 16, 18, 20):








Note: Connect the 5-pin card-reader plug to header 1 for future convenience if there is need to add another USB expansion connector.


These IDE ports each connects up to two IDE drives at Ultra ATA/100 mode by one 40-pin, 80-conductor, and 3-connector Ultra ATA/66 ribbon cables. Connect the single end (blue connector) at the longer length of ribbon cable to the IDE port on system board, and the other two ends (gray and black connector) at the shorter length of the ribbon cable to the connectors on hard drives.



NOTE: The red line on the ribbon cable should be aligned with pin-1 on this connector.

These connectors are provided to attach one Serial ATA device at each channel via Serial ATA cable.



Chapter 3. Hardware Setup

3.1. Precautions

Please pay attention to the following precautions before setting up any hardware.

- 1. Always switch off the power supply and unplug the power cord from the wall outlet before installing the board or changing any settings.
- 2. Ground yourself properly by wearing a static safety wrist strap before removing the board from the antistatic bag.
- 3. Hold the board by its edges. Avoid touching any component on it.
- 4. Avoid touching module contacts and IC chips

3.2. Remove The Chassis Cover




Unscrew the four screws at the rear side of the system chassis by fingers.



Pull the upper cover backward for about 2cm.



Lift up the upper cover.



Unscrew the optical-drive and hard-drive holder.



Take out the optical-drive and hard-drive holder.



This system is now ready to install the interior devices.

3.3. Install The Memory Module



Locate the DIMM slot on the motherboard. Hold two edges of the DIMM module carefully, keep away of touching its connectors. Align the notch key on the module with the rib on the slot. Watch out for the direction, since the module fits in one direction only.

Static electricity can damage the electronic components of the computer or optional boards. Before starting these procedures, ensure that you are discharged of static electricity by touching a grounded metal object briefly.



Firmly press the module into the slots by both thumbs until the ejector tabs at both sides of the slot automatically snaps into the mounting notch. Do not force the DIMM module in with extra force as the DIMM module only fit in one direction.



The memory module is firmly installed.

3.4. Install the CPU and Thermal Module



Locate the CPU socket on the motherboard. Pull the CPU socket lever sideways away from the socket and then upwards to vertical position.



Insert the CPU with the correct orientation. Do not use extra force to insert CPU; it only fits in one orientation. Close down the socket lever while holding down the CPU.




Align the thermal module toward the heat-sinking hole at rear panel.



Put the thermal module onto the CPU die. Align the four screws on thermal module with the four screw holes on motherboard.



Fasten the four screws on thermal module by the order of 1 through 4.



Connect the fan-power plug of the thermal module to the CPU FAN1 header on the motherboard.



Use the rubber buckle to fasten the fan-duct by the order of 1 through 3.


3.5. Install the Fan-Duct



Pass the fan-power plug of the fan-duct through the I/O shield into the chassis.



Connect the fan-power plug of the fan-duct to the SYS FAN1 header on motherboard.



Use one rubber buckle to fasten the fan-duct through the chassis with the external heat sink of thermal module.

Fasten the other two screw holes of fan-duct onto rear panel.

Watch out for the tension laid on screws when fastening.

3.6. Install & Connect the Optical Drive and Card Reader

The optical-drive holder of this system is capable of installing two 5.25" optical drives. The diagrams illustrated here are using one optical drive for example.

Don't forget the Master/Slave configuration when installing two optical drives.



The card reader is already installed beneath the lower layer of the optical drive. Check the signal cable connection.



Install one optical drive into the bay. Fasten the optical drive to the drive holder.



Pass the optical drive cable through the cable hole.

Connect the signal and audio cable to the optical drive.



Connect the power cord to optical drive.




Slide in the holder into the chassis by 45 degree.



Align the screw holes with the holes on the chassis.




Fasten the optical-drive holder to the chassis.



Connect the 5-pin plug of card-reader cable to one roll of the FP-USB1 or FP-USB2 header on motherboard.

There are two extra USB headers on the motherboard, each provides two USB channel connection. You may connect the 5-pin card-reader cable to each one of these headers. Make sure to face the sticker side of the 5-pin card-reader toward the PCI slot.



We recommend connecting to header I for future convenience if there is need to add another USB expansion connector.



Connect the audio cable from the connector of audio-out on optical-drive to the CD1 on motherboard.


Connect the other side of the optical-drive cable to the IDE2 connector on motherboard.

Note: The dimension of optical drive is limited to 199mm deep.


3.7. Install the System Fan



Take out system fan and its rubber buckle.



Fasten the system fan to the chassis with four rubber buckles.



Identify the air-blow direction. Make sure to install the fan so as to blow the air out. 3-14 Chapter 3



Firmly press in the four rubber buckles.



Connect the fan-power plug of the system fan to the AUX FAN1 header on motherboard.

3.8. Install the AGP or PCI Expansion Card







If you want to install ATA and SATA hard drive together, make sure to install the SATA hard drive at the upper layer.




This motherboard provides a programmable EEPROM that you can update the BIOS utility. The BIOS (Basic Input/Output System) is a program that deals with the basic level of communication between processor and peripherals. Use the BIOS Setup program only when installing motherboard, reconfiguring system, or prompted to "Run Setup".

After powering up the system, the BIOS message appears on the screen, the memory count begins, and then the following message appears on the screen:

Press DEL to run setup

If this message disappears before you respond, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl> + <Alt> + keys, or by pressing the Reset button on computer chassis. Only when it failed by these two methods can you restart the system by powering it off and then back on.

After pressing key, the main menu screen appears.




NOTE: In order to increase system stability and performance, our engineering staffs are constantly improving the BIOS menu. The BIOS setup screens and descriptions illustrated in this manual are for your reference only, may not completely match what you see on your screen.

4.1. SoftMenu Setup

The SoftMenu utility is ABIT's exclusive and ultimate solution in programming the CPU operating speed. All the parameters regarding CPU FSB speed, multiplier factor, the AGP & PCI clock, and even the CPU core voltage are all available at your fingertips.



CPU Operating Speed:

This item displays the CPU operating speed according to the type and speed of your CPU. You can also select the [User Define] option to enter the manual option.

※ CPU FSB Clock (MHz):

This item selects the external clock frequency.

* Multiplier Factor:

This item selects the multiplier factors for your CPU if it is not locked.

※ N/B Strap CPU As:

This item sets the external hardware reset strap assigned to MCH (Memory Controller Hub).

To set this option manually:

Select [PSB400] for CPU of 100MHz FSB frequency.

☀ DRAM Ratio (CPU:DRAM):

This item determines the frequency ratio between CPU and DRAM.

This item determines the ratio among CPU, AGP, and PCI.

☀ Fixed AGP/PCI Frequency:

This item determines the AGP/PCI bus frequency. This option allows you to keep your AGP/PCI clock at some fixed frequency to improve system stability.

CPU Power Supply:

This option allows you to switch between CPU default and user-defined voltages. Leave this setting to default unless the current CPU type and voltage setting cannot be detected or is not correct. The option [User Define] enables you to select the Core Voltage manually.

※ CPU Core Voltage:

This item selects the CPU core voltage.

ATTENTION: A wrong voltage setting may cause the system unstable or even damage the CPU. Please leave it to default settings unless you are fully aware of its consequences.

This item selects the voltage for DRAM slot.

This item selects the voltage for AGP slot.

IDE HDD Auto-Detection:

This item allows you to detect the parameters of IDE drives by pressing the <Enter> key. The parameters will automatically be shown on the screen.

IDE Channel 1 Master:

When set to [Auto], the BIOS will automatically check what kind of IDE drive you are using. If you want to define your own drive by yourself, set it to [Manual] and make sure you fully understand the meaning of the parameters. Refer to the manual provided by the device manufacturer to get the settings right.

Access Mode:

This item selects the mode to access your IDE devices. Leave this item to its default [Auto] settings to let BIOS detects the access mode of your HDD and makes decision automatically.

***** Capacity:

Shutdown Temperature:

This item sets the temperature that would shutdown the system automatically in order to prevent system overheats.

CPU Warning Temperature:

This item selects the CPU's warning temperature limit. Once the system has detected that the CPU's temperature exceeded the limit, warning beeps will sound.

NOTE: The onboard hardware monitor function is capable of detecting these system health conditions. Chapter 5. Driver Setup

After completed the hardware installation and the Windows operation system, the next procedure will be the driver setup. To set up the driver programs, all you need to do is:

- 1. Enter the Windows Operation System.
- 2. Insert the CD of Drivers & Utilities into your CD-ROM drive. The CD will run its program automatically. The driver menu appears.
 - If the CD will not run its program automatically, enter → [My Computer] → [CD-ROM] Drive → double click [autorun.exe]. The driver menu appears.
- After entering the driver menu, move your curser to [Drivers] tab. The first driver you need to install is the chipset driver. Click on item [Intel Chipset Software Utility]. Follow the on-screen instruction to complete its installation procedure.

• Intel Chipset Software Utility

Install the Intel chipset driver for Windows Operating System.

• Intel Extreme Graphics Driver

Install Intel graphics adapter driver for Windows Operating System.

• Audio Driver

Install the audio driver for Windows Operating System.

• LAN Driver

Install the LAN driver for Windows Operating System.

USB 2.0 Driver

Install the USB 2.0 driver for Windows Operating System.

Manual

View the user's manual in PDF file.

• Utility

Click to enter the sub-screen for installing Win Cinema, Card Reader, DirectX, Acrobat Reader, and Award Flash utility software.

Hardware Monitor

Click to enter the sub-screen for installing ABIT EQ software.

Browse CD

Browse the contents of this CD-ROM.

Close

Exit the CD setup Items Menu.

Chapter 6. Exercising Your DigiDice

6.1. Prior To Powering On The System

Connect your mini PC with keyboard, mouse, monitor, and power cord. Gently pressing the Shuttle Controller or the 0 <Power> button on Remote Controller will power on the system.

After plugged in with AC power, the LCD screen displays the time elapsed.



The time elapsed will be reset to zero if the AC power had been disconnected.

After powering the system, the time elapsed will be replaced with the system time of your mini PC.

6.2. Easy OC (Over Clocking) Setting

One of the most distinguished features of this mini PC system is the Over Clocking function. ABIT is now bringing you a non-overclocker proof technology with only 1-2-3 steps. This Easy OC setting increases the CPU Front Side Bus speed from 5% to 25% in the beginning of powering on your system. No need to enter the complicated setup menu of BIOS utility, all you have to do is to:

Step 1: Dial the Shuttle Controller.


Step 2: Make your selection.

Step 3: Press the Shuttle Controller to apply with your selection.

There are six options from [OC 0] through [OC 5] when powering on the system. A successful over clocking setting within these options from [OC 1] through [OC 5] will keep the system maintained until a next modification. A fail setting will reset the system to the non-overclocking [OC 0] status.


Note: Due to the restriction of CPU specification and many unpredicted system hardware environmental factor, there is no guaranty to make a successful over clocking setting.

OC 0:




Dial the Shuttle Controller clockwise. The LCD screen displays the OC number 0.

OC 1:




Dial the Shuttle Controller one clockwise click in the [OC 0] status; the LCD screen displays the OC step 1. This [OC 1] setting increases the CPU speed 5% up. One counter clockwise click will dial back one-step to [OC0].

OC 2:




Dial the Shuttle Controller one clockwise click in the [OC 1] status; the LCD screen displays the OC step 2. This [OC 2] setting increases the CPU speed 10% up. One counter clockwise click will dial back one-step to [OC1].

OC 3:




Dial the Shuttle Controller one clockwise click in the [OC 2] status; the LCD screen displays the OC step 3. This [OC 3] setting increases the CPU speed 15% up. One counter clockwise click will dial back one-step to [OC2].

OC 4:



Dial the Shuttle Controller one clockwise click in the [OC 3] status; the LCD screen displays the OC step 4. This [OC 4] setting increases the CPU speed 20% up. One counter clockwise click will dial back one-step to [OC3].

OC 5:



Dial the Shuttle Controller one clockwise click in the [OC 4] status; the LCD screen displays the OC step 5. This [OC 5] setting increases the CPU speed 25% up. One counter clockwise click will dial back one-step to [OC4].



6.3. Powering On The System

To power on the system, you may:


- (1) Press the Shuttle Controller after finished the OC setting.
- (2) Press the Shuttle Controller without making the OC setting.
 or
- (3) Press the <Power> button on Remote Controller.

Screen Shot 1:



All the icons illuminated for a short while.

The screen displays the "Easy OC Setting" page. The default setting is [OC 0]. You may dial the Shuttle Controller to enter the setting, or leave it without touching.

The screen displays the "Time" page. The time figure will be calibrated to the local hour according to your system time.

The screen displays: (1) The network-connecting icon if this system is connected to LAN, and (2) The volume level icon.

Now the system is ready to enter the Hardware Monitoring page and the of Hot-key application status.

6.4. Hot Key Controlling

Video Playing:



Press the [Video Control] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller, the system toggles on the [WinDVD] program. The video icon lights up.

Press the [Video Control] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller when the WinDVD program is launched will toggle it off.

Audio Playing:



Press the [**Audio Control**] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller, the system toggles on the [**WinRip**] program. The audio icon lights up.

Press the [Audio Control] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller when the WinRip program is launched will toggle it off.

Photo Viewing:



Press the [Photo Control] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller, the system toggles on the [Windows XP Photo Browser] program. The photo icon lights up.

Press the [**Photo Control**] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller when the Windows XP Photo Browser program is launched will toggle it off.

Program Copying:



Press the [Copy Control] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller, the system toggles on the [CloneCD] program. The photo icon lights up.

Press the [**Copy Control**] hot key on the front panel or on the remote controller when the CloneCD program is launched will toggle it off.

6.5. Hardware Monitoring (ABIT EQ Program)

The application [ABIT EQ] bundled in the CD of Drivers & Utilities is a self-diagnostic system to protect PC Hardware by monitoring critical items of Power Supply Voltage, CPU & System Fans Speed, and CPU & System Temperature. To utilize this feature, you have to install the ABIT EQ first.

To install the ABIT EO:

- 1. Enter the Windows Operation System.
- 2. Insert the CD of Drivers & Utilities into your CD-ROM drive. The CD will run its program automatically. The driver menu appears.

If the CD will not run its program automatically, enter → [My Computer] → [CD-ROM] Drive → double click [autorun.exe]. The driver menu appears.

3. After entering the driver menu, move your curser to [Hardware Doctor] tab. Click on item [ABIT EQ]. Follow the on-screen instruction to complete its installation procedure.



After the system is powered on, enter the [Program] in the Windows menu bar to click the [ABIT EQ] icon, all the hardware-monitoring parameters appear on the LCD screen one after another in serial mode. Press the shuttle controller will enter the fixed mode.

CPU Speed:



Dial the shuttle controller clock wise to view the [CPU Speed].

Press the shuttle controller to confirm viewing the CPU speed only.

Three seconds after non-confirmation will go back to the serial mode.

CPU Fan Speed:



Dial the shuttle controller clock wise further to view the [CPU Fan Speed].

Press the shuttle controller to confirm viewing the CPU fan speed only.

Three seconds after non-confirmation will go back to the serial mode.

CPU Temperature:



Dial the shuttle controller clock wise further to view the [CPU Temperature].

Press the shuttle controller to confirm viewing the CPU temperature only.

Three seconds after non-confirmation will go back to the serial mode.

System Temperature:



Dial the shuttle controller clock wise further to view the [System Temperature].

Press the shuttle controller to confirm viewing the system temperature only.

Three seconds after non-confirmation will go back to the serial mode.

System Fan Speed:



Dial the shuttle controller clock wise further to view the [System Fan Speed].

Press the shuttle controller to confirm viewing the system fan speed only.

Three seconds after non-confirmation will go back to the serial mode.

The ABIT EQ graphic table will also appears on your monitor screen.




This graphic table illustrates all the hardware information in these three circles one after another.

Move your mouse cursor and click on the down-arrow button in this graphic will pull down a detailed monitoring sub-screen.



Note: The [ABIT Manager] is the interface to transfer monitoring parameters to LCD screen. To enable the ABIT EQ, the "Run ABIT EQ when system start up" box must be checked in the [Display Setting] tab of [ABIT EQ].

6.6. Memory Card Reading


This mini PC is also equipped with two slots for digital storage card available for the following formats:

Upper Slot:

- SmartMedia Card (Up to 128MB)
- MultiMediaCard (From 16MB up to 128MB)
- Secure Digital Memory Card (From 16MB up to 256MB)
- Memory Stick (From 16MB up to 128MB)
- Memory Stick Pro (From 256MB up to 1GB)

Lower Slot:

- CompactFlash Card (Up to 512MB)
- IBM Micro Drive (From 340MB up to 1GB)



6.7. Powering Off The System

To power off the system, you may:

(1) Keep pressing the Shuttle Controller for more than four (4) seconds.



(2) The <PWR> characters appear on LCD screen. Press the Shuttle Controller once again within seven (7) seconds. (If not, the system will be back to its former power-on status.) The system will be shut down automatically.
